KINGSTOWN MAIL SERVICE,

Regular Service Re-established

There was no morning mail arrival at Kings-
town yesterday. The steamer being unable to
make the journey from Holyhead, mails and
passengers were forwarded to Ireland via Dublin
by London and North Western express-steamer.
The Duke of Connaught, which arrived at Kings-
town with the evening mail and nearly 900 pas-
senger, conveyed the night mail from Kingstown
to Holyhead. The Royal Mail Steamer Munster,
which was assisted by the company's staff at Holy-
head, will bring to-day's morning mail to Kings-
town. She will also make the outward morning
passage to Holyhead. This means that the regular
service was re-established to day.

KERRY COUNTY SECRETARYSHIP.

Mr William F. Quinlan, heir, was unanimously
appointed to the vacant position of County
Secretary of Kerry, held by his late brother, Mr
M. Quinlan. Messrs Edward Martyn, Assistant Co-
Secretary, and Michael J. O'Donnell were
applicants, but withdrew owing to the circum-
stances of the late secretary having left a widow
and a young family.

DEATH OF MR JOSEPH SHIER.

The death, which is greatly regretted, took
place at his residence, Prospect House, Barrigone,
on Sunday of Mr Joseph Shier, at the age of sixty-
three years. The deceased, who was an extensive
farmer, had not beenailing very long. He was
held in the highest esteem in Barrigone and
district, and this was manifested at the funeral
which took place to the family burial ground,
Ballingrane, on Tuesday. With his family the
deepest sympathy is felt in the bereavement they
have suffered.

At the meeting of the Foyne Credit Society,
Mr C Bourke presiding, a resolution was un-
animously adopted tendering to Mrs Joseph Shier
and family sincere and heartfelt sympathy in their
sorrow.

The deceased was chairman of the Society for
many years, and was highly esteemed for his
excellent business qualities and unvarying courtesy.
He was a most obliging neighbour, and his death
leaves a void in the locality not easily filled.

CORPORATION HOUSING COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the Corporation Housing Com-
mittee was held in the Council Chamber, Town
Hall, on Thursday night. Mr J. Daverer, B.C.,
Alderman McNeice, and other members of the
Committee were present, and the question of the
erection of some two thousand houses with plots
of land attached to each was considered in detail.
In the result a sub-committee was appointed
to report on the proposed scheme, and the Borough
Engineer, Mr J. J. Peacocke, was also asked to
advise the Committee in a special report as to
how best the object of the Committee in providing
much-needed house accommodation could be had
in the most feasible manner. The Committee
meanwhile adjourned to the second Thursday of
next month, when the report in question will be
considered.
