NEWCASTLE WEST AGRICULTURAL SHOW.

At the last meeting of the Executive Committee of the Newcastle West Agricultural and Horticultural Show, Captain Curling, J.P., presided. Members present were—Very Rev P C O'Connell, V.F.; Rev E Fitzgerald, C.C.; Mr J Phelan, J.P.; J D Leahy, C.E.; J M J.P.; J Ryan, M Murphy, T.C.; Thomas R Nash, T Moynihan, and M B O'Connell, Secretary.

A preliminary statement of accounts for the year ending 29th was submitted, and was considered satisfactory. Auditors were appointed, and expected that the yearly report will be ready so as to enable the annual general meeting to be held on the 9th of January. In connection with the grant of £105 from the County Council, Agriculture Captain Curling said that the grant of this year was due to the kindly assistance of Father Fitzgerald as a member of the Committee of Agriculture, and on the occasion of the Chairman's unanimous and hearty vote of thanks was passed to Father Fitzgerald for his very great work in the interests of the Show. Father Fitzgerald thanked the Committee, and hoped for the co-operation of members of the Show Committee to secure a larger grant for next year's fixtures. A resolution relative to the restoration of the pig markets, such as were held in Newcastle West previous to the Order made by the Control Committee, was ordered to be referred to Mr T P Gill, Secretary Department of Agriculture.
