GENERAL SIR E. ALLENBY'S DESPATCH.

General Sir E Allenby, Commanding-in-Chief the Egyptian Expeditionary Force, in a despatch of Ostober 31, sovering the operations from September 19, resulting in the destruction of the enemy's army, the liberation of Palestine and Syria, and the occupation of Damascus and Alepso, states that between September 19 and October 25. 75,000 prisoners were espeured. Of these, over 200 officers and 3,500 other ranks were Germans and Austrians. In addition, 360 guns fell into the Allies' hands, with the transport and equipment of three Turkish armies. The depends included over \$00 meshine gans, \$10 motor forries, 44 motor ears, some 3,500 asimale, 59 engines, and 468 earriages and trucks.
