THE MAYORALTY.

At the quarterly meeting of the Corporation at the Town Hall, on Thursday, the election of the Mayor of the city for a period of twelve months took place. So far there is only one candidate for the office—the outgoing holder—Mr. Alphonse M. O'Mara, whose re-election is therefore assured. The Council will also be asked to select three persons qualified to hold the office of High Sheriff, one of whom is to be appointed by the Lord Lieutenant. In this connection, too, the outgoing bearer of the office, Mr. H. Roche, J.P., will not have to face a contest as he will be re-elected unanimously.

A plea of not guilty was then assumed, and evidence in support of the charge was heard.
