CAERPHILLY CHEESE. IRISH

Conferences have been held at Limerick and at the Ministry of Food, London with reference to the position of Irish Caerphilly cheese pro-duction during the coming season.

It was further pointed out that the strong market which had existed for some time past in Great Britain for Caerphily had been mere or less fictitious, and was brought about by the great shortage of sheere.
