LABOUR AND SINK FEIN.

In the Trades' Hall, Chapel street, on Sunday night Mr Thomas Nagle delivered a lecture, under the auspices of the Irish Socialist Labour Union "Sinn Fein and Labour," in the course of which he said that the Sinn Fein movement was similar to previous movements of a so-called patriotic kind but it was really supported by capitalists who wanted to rob labour. It was but drawing another eddying across the track. Without gaining economic reform, the gaining of the promised independence for Ireland would be utterly useless. They talked of bringing American millionaires to his country to carry on manufacture, but he would send these men back to America, where their money could be used by the people they despised. Sinn Fein was not run in the interests of Labour, but was harmful to it, as the Home Rule movement had been in the past. It was not for what the Sinn Feiners put forward that Labour should work but for a real economic reform.

A discussion followed.
