

In the Thurles district on Sunday morning the police saw some men drilling. The men, on seeing that they were observed, immediately dispersed, and then opened fire on the police. The fire was returned, with the result that three civilians were wounded and two taken prisoner. The police suffered no casualty.

## LATE FATHER McCARTHY, P.P., DONOUGHMORE.

An interesting function took place on Sunday forenoon at Donoughmore, where a Celtic cross was unveiled by the Most Rev Dr Hallinan as a memorial to the late parish priest, Father M. McCarthy, the second anniversary of whose lamented death the occasion was. The cross was subscribed for by the parishioners, to whom Father McCarthy during his ministrations in the parish made himself specially dear, proving a wise counsellor and putting forth all his exertions for their temporal and spiritual interest. There was a religious service in the Church previous to the ceremony, and there was an overflow congregation, which included two brothers of the deceased—Mr P J McCarthy, solicitor, Bandon, and Mr D C McCarthy, Ardfatrick. Rev Louis Foley, Professor of Theology at Belmont College, preached an eloquent discourse on the life and services of Father McCarthy; and after the unveiling of the cross, Dr Hallinan addressed the people present on the missionary work of one who had been his life-long friend from the days when he and Father McCarthy entered the Irish College at Rome as students. Rev S J Connolly, Adm, St John's; Very Rev Canon Russell, P.P.; and Rev W Fitzgerald, P.P., Munster, were among the clergymen at the ceremonial.

## DEATH OF MASTER BRIAN E. SHEEHY

## DEATH OF MR JAMES SHANAHAN.

Regret will be felt in the city at the death of Mr James Shanahan, which occurred on the night of the 19th ult at his residence, Foyne, where he lived since his retirement some years ago from the service of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company.
