### SINN FEIN POLICY.

#### Reported New Campaign.

A correspondent of the Press Association writing on the situation in Ireland, says:—"The is reason to believe that the more aggressive sition of the Sinn Feiners, basing their hope on intervention on behalf of Ireland by the Peace Conference, have come to the conclusion that the present is an opportu moment to attract the attention of the wor to the wrongs under which they contend th Ireland suffers. Realising the futility of attempt ing any repetition of the abortive rebellion of 191 they appear to have decided on other measures. focus the public mind on the Irish question, ar there seems to be good ground for th belief that a campaign is contemplated o the lines of the militant methods adopted in England by the "suffragettes" in pr war times. The authorities responsible fo the maintenance of law and order in Ireland profess that they are prepared to afford adequat protection to life and property, while giving n provocation by any parade of force. They b lieve that with tact and discrimination they may be able to tide over the threatened trouble.

The measure suspending the Home Rule Act automatically expires six months after the signing of peace, and it is understood that the present intention of the Government is not to propose any further postponement of the Act, unless new circumstances should arise which appear to them to warrant such a course.
