NEW TILLAGE ORDER. The new Irish Tillage Order of the Department of Agriculture, published yesterdsy, provides, with certain exceptions, that the minimum tillage portion of every holding for the current year shall be equivalent in extent to 15 per cent of the area thereof. Compared with previous Orders, which required 15 per cent of the entire holding to be tilled where half had not been cultivated in 1916, this is a new departure, and, doubtless a welcome one from the farmer's point of view. The Order issued in 1918 required that in addition to the then existing stipulation as te 15 per cent, the larger holdings of 200 arable acres and apwards should till 5 per cent, or a total over the amount cultivated in 1916 of 30 per cent. This additional tillage was, of course, necessitated by the food carolity or what was anticipated to take place as the result of a continuance of the war.
