The Housing Department of the Local Gov ment Board for Ireland has issued the follo-

Pending the enactment of the Housing of Working Class (Ireland) Bill, local authorities been encouraged to take into immediate consid t on the requirements of their several distr In a circular, dated the 31st March, 1919, Local Government Board expressed the opi housing situation, the preparation of scheme local authorities should not be postponed until introduction of fresh legislation," and in a fur circular, dated the 5th May, detailed advice given regarding the selection of sites, group and aspect of houses, the maximum unmber to built per sere, and the accommodation to be wided.

Since, however, both the extent and chara of new schemes have been necessarily dependupon the shape which the Housing Bloom finally assume in its passage through Parliam more expecially in respect of its financial provisi the local authorities have not been able to proc very far with their schemes up to the prese but now that the Bill has passed through House of Commons, and the financial provi have been finally settled, no obstacles or un tainties remain which should debar the 1 authorities from at once proceeding to comp their schemes, which must be submitted to Board before the 15th April, 1920, in orde participate in the very advantageous terms offe by the State for Irish bousing.

Last month the Housing Committee of Local Government Board issued a memorand showing what private individuals and association can do to help in solving the housing prob through the formation of Public Utility Societ In addition, draft rules and regulations relat to such societies, and also to housing trusts he been prepared, but their publication has be retarded owing to the dispute in the print trade in Dublin,

. It should be borne in mind that the initial in promoting schemes lies not with the Le Government Board, but with the local authorit (Corporations of County Boroughs, Urban Dist Councils, and Towns Commissioners), and w augh private persons as may decide promote Public Utility Societies or House Trusts. Only in the improbable event of 1 authorities neglecting altogother to exercise the rights and duties under the bill can the Li Government Board act in their default.
