THE LATE MR JOHN O'MARA.

The funeral of the late Mr John O'Mara took place this morning from St. Munchin's Parochial Church, whither the remains of the lamented deceased had been removed from his residence overnight, for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery. DEATH OF MR DAVID BEGLEY.

We regret to record the death of an old and very highly esteemed fellow-citizen, Mr David Begley, who passed away to-day at his residence, Shannon Ville, Ennis Road, after an illness of some duration. Mr Begley for many years had been prominently connected with commercial life in this city. He was for a considerable time, as representative of the Market Ward, a member of the City Corporation, where, as elsewhere, his invariably courteous manner and sound business principles were valued to the full. He was a Nationalist in politics, and at one time actively connected with political life. His demise has been heard of with sincere regret in the city, and there is general sympathy with his family and relatives on their bereavement. The remains will be removed to St Munchin's parochial church at 8 o'clock tomorrow (Sunday) evening. Office and High Mass at 11 a.m. on Monday, after which the funeral takes place for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.

IMPORTATION OF CANADIAN STORE CATTLE.

At a special meeting of the Council of the Royal Dublin Society, held on Thursday afternoon, the Right Hon. Frank Wrench, D.L., Vice-President, in the chair, the following resolution was adopted:—"The Council are unanimous in their opinion that every step should be taken to resist the introduction of Canadian store cattle into the United Kingdom, and that on no account should the repeal of 'The Diseases of Animals Act, 1896,' be entertained. That a meeting of all bodies interested in the question (including all agricultural and breed societies and kindred associations) be held at Leinster House, Dublin, on Thursday next, 31st inst., at 2.30 p.m. with a view of taking joint action.

DISCHARGED SOLDIERS AND LORD FRENCH.

A meeting of the Galway and District Branch of the Discharged Soldiers' and Sailors' Society, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—"That we, the members of the Discharged Soldiers and Sailors' Society, Galway and district, hereby tender our sincere thanks to His Excellency Lord French for the great sympathy he has shown, and the active interest he has taken, not only in the ex-service men here in Galway but throughout the country.
