T PRISONERS' PLIGHT.

A., gave a revolting description of the conditions in which the prisoners were, and said he had no attention from Fratel when in hospital. He refused to see a soldier named Wiseman, he could not be bothered, and Wiseman died the evening. Cross-examined, he said he did not remember that Fratel was very ill, and he did not know that Fratel was under a Greek named

lieutenant named Taylor, who is now blind, said he took Sergeant Dye to hospital in a dying condition, and he found Fratel in his room asking and reading. Fratel said he would go to a second, and as he was not out in half an hour, witnesses went again to him, when Fratel said to be careful, or he would get him the same way (a rawhide thong with which men were

lieutenant J Connor, R.F.A., said he took a soldier in a dying condition to hospital, and Fratel refused to take him to a tent. Witnesses remained in the hospital nearly two hours, during which he was not attended, and he had since made inquiries, but never trace the man. Lieutenant C Trice, R.F.A., said he and two other soldiers reported sick, and Fratel kept one man in the hospital for four hours. They had to crawl half a mile to hospital, where they got a dose of medicine and they had to crawl back to camp. One died the next morning.

Sergeant Porter, who was in charge of Newmarket barracks, 7 miles from Ennis, which was raided on Tuesday morning, attempted suicide yesterday morning by cutting his throat. He was attended by Dr Conuahan, Ennis, and removed to Clare infirmary. It is stated he may recover.

Another outrage is reported from East Clare, where the police hut at Moynoe, about four miles from Scarriff, and close to the residence of Dr F C Sampson, J.P., for whose protection it was established, was attacked yesterday morning about 2 a.m. by a party of between thirty and forty men, who opened violent rifle and revolver fire at it.
