SHOOTING TRAGEDY IN WEST LIMERICK.

A painful sensation was caused in the village of Broadford, Co Limerick, on Wednesday night, at about 10 o'clock pm, when the news reached there that an extensive farmer named Owen Daly, of Rowel, County Cork, had been shot dead at Tallagh Cross, about a half-mile distant. A couple of cyclists on their way to the village brought the information, and a number of men went to the scene of the outrage and carried the lifeless body of the unfortunate man to a friend's house, not far distant, where it remained until the following day, when a post-mortem examination was made by Doctors O'Shaughnessy and McCarthy. An inquest was held on Thursday by Mr Robert O'Connell, solicitor, Coroner for the district, and the evidence showed that deceased was about 50 years of age, unmarried, and a large farmer and grazier in the district. The shooting is believed to be the outcome of some agrarian dispute, and the evidence points to more than one person being concerned in the murder. The deceased appears to have been fired at several times, and death must have been instantaneous, Daly having been shot through the left wrist and chest as he was proceeding homeward along the public road. The jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against some person or persons unknown. The news of the outrage was received with profound regret at Rowel where the deceased was popular. The funeral, which took place on Friday from Broadford, for Clonfert, was of large dimensions. The greatest sympathy is extended to his many friends in their sad bereavement. On the night of the fatality Rev Fr Wall, O.C., Broadford, who was summoned, was in immediate attendance, but life had long since been extinct. So far no arrests have been made.
