GAMBLE IN BLOODSTOCK.

A thoroughbred yearling colt was sold on Thursday at the Doncaster Bloodstock Sales for 11,500 to Lord Glanely, who won the Derby this year at Grand Parade. Only time and the hard work of a race-course can prove whether he is to be a profitable sire, says "The Times." If so, he will be of real value to this country, in which the world still looks for the best horses. But we show that only a very few of the highest-yearlings justify their cost in after years. The only way of testing "blood" in times of peace is at the racetrack, where the prizes are great, not much because of the money which they give in, but because of the value which they give as successful as sires or brood mares. England and Ireland are the chief horse-markets of the world.
