MR RUNCIMAN AND IRELAND.

Mr Walter Runciman, speaking in Edinburgh yesterday, said that he was in favour of Dominion Home Rule for Ireland, with the exception of the Navy and Foreign Affairs. With regard to the Government's financial policy, he said that, while he did not believe that the country was going bankrupt, they would run dangerously near the risk of having to suspend some of their payments, unless revenue went up or expenditure went down.
