# DISTRESSING CITY FATALITY.

# Two Marine Apprentices Drowned.

A distressing occurrence took place in the Shannon outside the entrance to the Limerick docks yesterday afternoon, by which two apprentices named Crowther and Lennox, of the steamer "Irmgard," lost their lives. The vessel arrived in port about a fortnight ago with maize for Mesers J Bannatyne & Sons, but while she was being discharged a strike of dock labourers (still unsettled) occurred, with the result that operations had to be suspended. In the circumstances it was decided by the consignors to divert her to a gross-Channel port, but there was a difficulty experienced in getting a pilot to take her down the river. Government aid was secured, and the services of Commander Robinson, of the Admiralty, were availed of for this purpose, and accordingly arrived to pilot the vessel sea. The "Irmgard" left her moorto ses. The "Irmgard" left her moor-lngs in the docks at two o'clook yes-terday, there being a large force of police and military present to prevent any interference with her. She came out estern and in order to get her into the fairway four apprentices took to a small boat for the purpose of running the lines to help in getting the vessel clear. The propeller, while the boat was close to the steamer, stopped for a moment, and when the vessel was again put in motion the propellor struck the small eraft, with the painful result that the four occupants were thrown into the water. One of them must have been struck by the propeller, for he never rose to the surface, and the other three struggled for a time. Captain Anderson, of the "Irmgard" pluckily jumped from the bridge into the water to his comrades rescue, as did also a Highland soldier who was aboard the steamer at the time With the aid of a raft two of the men were resoued. but the other was drowned in swimming from the scene of the accident to mid river. In the unhappy circumstances the vessel returned to her berth, where she at present lies. At the time of the latality there was a large crowd of people on the quays, and the sad occurrence created a sensation, and deep sympathy for the men who lost their lives. Up to the present the bodies have not been recovered.

# EXTRAORDINARY RAID IN CORK.

## Railway Staff Held up

Fifty of the night staff of the Cork, Bandon, and South Coast Railway were at work when a party of armed men entered the station and held up every official in the premises. It is not known, how many raiders took part in the affair, but it is reckoned that at least there were between 150 and 200 men.
