

Steam Coals. The coal must be "through and through." The coal must be fresh wrought at the time of shipment, and must be delivered (carriage free), ex-ship or rail, direct to Workhouse, and be weighed at the Harbour Commissioners' lever before delivery. The contractors will be required to state the name of the collieries from which they intend to supply Tenders to be sent through the post, addressed to the Presiding Chairman, and must reach the Workhouse not later than twelve noon on the above-named date, marked on outside "Steam Coals." Contractors will be required to execute a bond at their own expense, and must attend at the Clerk's Office with their sureties for the purpose of signing same within ten days of the declaration of the contract, otherwise the contract will be annulled. A sum of £3 must be lodged with each tender. The Guardians do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender.—By order.

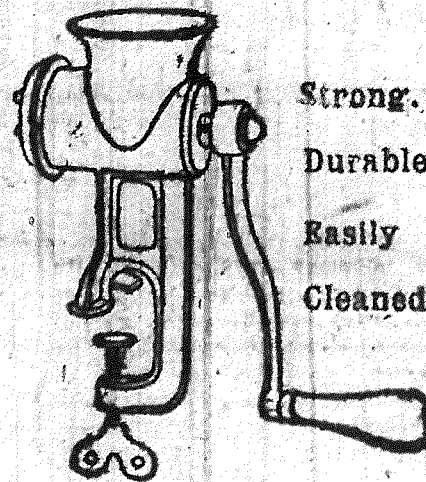
