**Tributes from Bench.**

An impressive and touching tribute of admira-  
 tion and respect was paid yesterday in the Four  
 Courts to the memory of the late Lord Chief Baron  
 Pallen by the Bench, Bar, and solicitors' branch of  
 the legal profession. The Judges of the different  
 Divisions assembled in the Nisi Prius Court No. 1  
 before taking up the business of their court, and  
 a large number of members of the Bar and of the  
 solicitors' profession were also in attendance. All  
 remained standing while eloquent addresses were  
 being delivered by the Lord Chancellor, on behalf  
 of the Bench; by Sergeant Sullivan, on behalf of  
 the Bar; and by Mr Blair White, President of  
 the Incorporated Law Society.

The Lord Chancellor said that by the death of  
 Christopher Pallen there passed away the greatest  
 lawyer and judge of his day and generation, and  
 the nation had lost a gifted and distinguished  
 Irishman.

**Four English Outbreaks.**

The existence of foot-and-mouth disease was  
 confirmed on Sunday amongst animals on four  
 separate premises, one of which was at Ludgers-  
 hall, Bucks, and the other three in Oxfordshire.  
 All four outbreaks were connected.

**ALDERMAN T. KELLY RELEASED**

The "Morning Post" understands that Mr  
 Kelly, M.P., Sinn Fein member for the

 Wormwood Scrubbs Prison. He was met at the  
 gates by his solicitor. Mr Kelly was one  
 of several who were arrested in Dublin some three  
 months ago and subsequently deported to  
 the country.

**SUGGESTED WIRELESS FOR THE R.I.**

The Belfast correspondent of the "Morning  
 Post," referring to the attack on Ballytrain police  
 barracks, says:—The successful attacks on  
 police barracks in the South and West are a  
 grave concern amongst the members of the Royal  
 Irish Constabulary in Belfast, who feel that their  
 comrades are not receiving the support they ask  
 from the Government. The suggestion is made  
 that each barracks in the disaffected districts  
 should be equipped with wireless, so that  
 an appeal for assistance could be sent out at once  
 when a barrack was attacked.

**ENGLISH RAILWAY STATION
