PRICE OF IRISH PROVINCIAL PAPERS.

The Irish Master Printers' Association has repently had under consideration the alaraning increase in the ocet of newsprint because admitted world shertage of wood pulp. In the circumstanges, it is felt that an all round increase in the selling price of papers is demanded, and that no provincial paper should now be sold to the public at a less figure than 2d per copy.

"Ordinary common paper, which a month or two ago could be got at £32 a tou, has jumped now to £60 ; ton, and is going up every day." says the "Roscommon Herald." The London "Express" points sut that the paper in each copy costs three halfpence, and they are selling for a perny. The 'Freeman's Journal' informs its readers that the paper now in each copy coats twopence, and they are still selling at a penny. This, of course cannot last long, and prices will have to go up."

According to the "Newspaper World" 15 more newspapers and periodicals last week in ereased their price, making 65 this year. The "Connecht Tribune" is increasing its price next week to 2d.
