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**LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS.**

The Limerick Quarter Sessions were resumed  
yesterday morning by his Honor County Court  
Judge Pigot. The business consisted of the  
hearing of city defended civil bills, which were  
few, and of no public importance.

County Court Judge Pigot to-day continued  
the hearing of defended civil bills, which were  
mainly claims against the G.S & W and the  
London and North-Western Railway Company  
for small amounts through damage or loss in con-  
nexion with the transit of goods, by the action of  
the respective companies' servants. Her  
Gazette obtained a decree against the G.S & W  
Railway Company for £22 1s, in connexion with  
the transit of two cylinders and the loss sustained  
thereby.

The business of the Quarter Sessions was to  
conclude this evening, and to-morrow County  
Court Judge Pigot opens the Quarter Sessions for  
the division of Newcastle West. The cases for  
hearing include 10 ejectments, 14 civil bills (seven  
of which are defended), seven malicious injuries,  
and one town tenant's case.

**DEATH AND FUNERAL OF MR  
DAVID KELLY.**

The death, which is regretted by a wide circle  
of friends, took place at his residence, Bally-  
bricken, on Sunday of Mr David Kelly, after an  
illness of considerable duration. The deceased  
was a well known and respected county resident,  
and farmed extensively at Ballybricken. He was  
a member of the Limerick Board of Guardians up  
to the passing of the Local Government Act of  
1898, and in that capacity he earned the esteem  
of his fellow-members by his probity and rec-  
titude in his administration of the Poor Law,  
while he was always anxious and willing  
to make the lot of the sick and poor as  
light as possible. His death, at a comparatively  
early age, has come as a severe loss to his widow  
and family, to whom general sympathy is extended  
in their affliction. The funeral took place on  
Tuesday for the family burial-place at Donough-  
more, and was attended by a large and represen-  
tative concourse of mourners.
