while strongly approving of the action of the Farmers' Union in refusing to enter a conference with the Trades' Council until the embargo on the shipment of butter and bacon was removed, they considered that further and more vigorous action was necessary, and believed that the Executive of the Irish Farmers' Union should be summoned immediately to give a strong lead in the matter.

The following resolution was proposed by Mr P K Hegan, and seconded unanimously—"That we, the Limerick Farmers' Association, call upon the Co-operative Creamery Societies in County Limerick and all Ireland, and every producer in the county, not to sell butter for home consumption less than 350s per cwt, and not to recognise any self-constituted central butter control authority, pending the decision of next Tuesday's conference of the Irish Farmers' Union in Dublin."

Mr Walsh, General Sec and Organiser, was directed to wire this decision to the managers of the Co-operative Creameries in Limerick. It was understood that the sixty Co-operative Creamery Societies would be well represented at next Tuesday's conference.

Many items on the agenda were unavoidably postponed to next meeting.

**DEATH OF MR ROBERT COLL.**

By a wide circle of friends in County Limerick and elsewhere the news of the unexpected demise of Mr Robert Coll, J.P., Maidstone Castle, Brurea, has been received with sincere regret. Mr Coll took suddenly ill on arrival at Limerick on Thursday, and was removed to St. John's Hospital, where he passed away sometime afterwards. Mr Coll was a very extensive farmer, and was Chairman of the the Limerick County Council from 1902 to the following year, when he retired from the Council, of which he had been a valued and highly esteemed member for some years. He was subsequently appointed an Inspector under the Estates Commission, and it is interesting to relate that he was one of those consulted in connection with the drafting of the Wyndham Act. He was a man of a very courteous and retiring disposition, keen judgment, and, as already stated, possessing a wide knowledge of agricultural affairs. His premature demise is much regretted, and deep sympathy is expressed with his widow and family in their bereavement. The funeral took place to-day for the family burial place at Dromin.
