THE LATE VENERABLE ARCHDEACON HAYDN.

Limerick Diocesan Council.

At a meeting of the Limerick Diocesan Council held in Limerick on 22nd ult., the following vote of sympathy with the relatives of the late Archdeacon was passed unanimously:—"That at this our first meeting of the Limerick Diocesan Council since the death of the Venerable John Armour Haydn, LL.D., late Archdeacon of Limerick, we wish to place on record our sincere regret at his death. He was a quiet Christian gentleman, who had many great gifts, hardly recognised by the Church on account of his retiring nature. As a preacher he was both thoughtful and learned, and many of us remember with gratitude his thoughtful discourses in the Cathedral, to which he devoted almost infinite pains. He was well known as a skilled musician on many instruments, and a composer of no mean attainments, and at our Cathedral our chants are often sung to his settings. We regret his loss deeply, and tender to his son and daughter our most sincere sympathy in their sad bereavement."
