DEATH OF MR WM H M BENNETT, J.P.

The death occurred on Sunday at his residence,
Glensiefy, Galbally, County Limerick, of Mr Wm
H Massey Bennett, J.P. The deceased, who was
aged about 70, came of an old County Limerick
family. He was first cousin of Lieut-General
Dunham Massey, D.L., of Granstown Hall, Tip-
perary, known as "Redan" Massey. He was
many years attached to the National Bank in
Tipperary, being subsequently promoted to the
managership of the branch house in Clonmel. For
a period of about 40 years he had been a Justice
of the Peace for Tipperary, Galbally, and Bansha.
During most of that time he was Chairman of the
Bench, and it is noteworthy that he scarcely ever
missed an attendance at the sessions in these
places. He was an excellent magistrate, his
rulings being marked by shrewd commonsense,
always tempering justice with mercy. By his
brother magistrates he was held in the highest
esteem, while his broad-minded and tolerant view
of things, and his genial and kindly manner won
him the regard and respect of the county at large.

O'CURRY IRISH COLLEGE.
