POLICE AMBUSHED NEAR CASHEL.

Sergeant Killed

Cashel, Friday Night.—This evening, as Sergeant Tobin and three constables were proceeding from Cashel to their station at Ballinure, they were attacked by an ambushed party midway between Lusla village and Ballinure Barracks, and Sergeant Tobin was killed, Constable Brady being wounded. The scene of the attack is about five miles from Cashel. Military and police left here about 6.30, and the motor in which District-Inspector Gilman travelled returned about 8.30, carrying the lifeless body of Sergeant Tobin. The deceased leaves a widow and a young family to mourn his loss. Constable Brady volunteered for service early in the war, and was seriously wounded.

WEST LIMERICK MOTOR ACCIDENT.

Fatal Result

Abbeyfeale, Friday.—Mr Maurice Neligan, the Labour Organiser, Tralee, who met with a motorcycle accident on Wednesday night, died at Templeglantine yesterday evening from his injuries. His death is extremely and universally regretted, particularly by the Irish Transport Workers, who have lost an able advocate. Miss Neligan, who was with him on the occasion and was injured, is somewhat improved.
