A Bill to deal with the refusal of Irish authorities to strike a rate for compensation for dependents of policemen shot is to be introduced by the Chief Secretary, says the "Morning Post."

"The Dublin Corporation has long been re- calcitrant about the rate of 8d in the £ for the upkeep of the D.M.P. but, by a special Act the Government is able to set off the sum the rate would yield—roughly, £50,000 a year—against the State grants for local purposes to which the Corporation is entitled.

These amount to about £56,000 a year. The Bill proposes to extend this power to the whole of Ireland, and to compensation claims and other liabilities of the local bodies.

It will happen probably in some districts that the amount due from the authorities as the result of outrages is in excess of the sums due as Treasury grants, and under this measure the money will be spread over a longer time than a year.

On the other hand, the State will pay the com- pensation claims at once. Moreover the Bill pro- poses that a compensation order of the County Court shall be treated as a judgment of the High Court, so that the Government will be able to obtain a garnishee order—the same thing as a writ of attachment in England on the rates."

## FUNERAL OF CONSTABLE LENIHAN.

The remains of the late Constable Michael Lenihan, who was shot dead by an armed party on the road between Cloughans and Dingle on Tuesday night, arrived in Limerick by motor on Thursday evening from Dingle, and were deposited in St. Mary's Parochial Church, where they rested overnight. Yesterday, at three o'clock, the inter- ment took place in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery in presence of a large number of the city police force. A hearse or a driver, it is stated, could not be obtained, and the coffin was carried to the cemetery on the shoulders of members of the constabulary. In front of the bier walked a military firing party, and immediately came the relatives of the deceased constable, and a strong representation of the city and district force under District Inspector Blayne.

Last evening also the remains of Constable Roche, who was shot on the same occasion, passed through the city by motor car for interment in Clare, of which the deceased was a native.

## IRISH BUTTER SUPPLY.

### The Question of Cold Storage.

The question of cold-storing Irish butter to provide for the shortage next winter is still un- decided as regards the fixing of a price to please producers, retailers, and consumers. It is be- lieved the Department, if a voluntary arrange- ment is not come to, will exercise its powers under the Food Ministry and prohibit export un- til a sufficient quantity is cold-stored, and will also fix a winter retail maximum price of 3s. per lb. Should this not be done it is probable (says the "Independent") that the transport workers may again, as they did last year, refuse to facilitate export of butter until the requirements of the Irish consumers are safeguarded. Ne- gotiations are still proceeding between the De- partment and the representatives of the interests concerned.
