#### MERICK CHRONICLE SERIOUS OCCURRENCES AT BRUREE.

Sequel to Attack on Military and Police Patrol.

Two Civilians Killed

Tragic occurrences have taken place at Bruree within the past few days.

Following an attack on a military and police patrol in the district on Thursday evening and the wounding of a colder, the patrol took possession of, and barricaded themselves in a cottage from which they returned the attackers' fire until reinforcements arrived.

Later solidiers and pelite under an officer proseeded to Bruree, where shots were fired. A hoy was shot dead near his home. While searching a house occupied by two brothers, one a cripple and the other an invalid, shots again rang out. On rushing in the immates found the dead body of the invalid on the floor. invalid on the flor.

Before leaving the village further shooting took place in the street, and so terrified were the inhabitants that many of them left their homes and went to friends in the country for safety.

The names of the civilians killed are given as

Patrick Doggan, aged 10, and Thomas Harris, an epileptio.

A soldier was seriously wounded.

#### OFFICIAL REPORT.

The Headquarters, Irish Command, Parkgate street, Dablin, supply the following to the Press:—
"The following official report has been re-

ocived:

"A patrol of military and police were ambushed by about 50 arned men outside Bruree at 5 p.m on 29-7-20. One soldier was seriously wounded and his rifls and 4 bloycles were taken.

"The patrol returned the fire and then took up a defensive position in a cottage, which was surrounded and attacked.

"Reinforcements from Bruff disp reed the attackers, who field to the village. One civilian was shot dead and others are believed to have been wounded. wounded.

br Byrnes gave evidence that he had examined the deceased Harris, whom witness found dead in his house. A ballet wound in the chest was the same of death, the bullet having prered the chest, passing through the heart, and coming out at the balk of deceased. Harris was about 30, and subject to epileptic attacks.

Rvidence as to identity was given, and the jury found according to the medical testimony, adding a rider to the effect that they believed the shot was fired by either the police or military.

The inquest as to the death of Patrick Duggan

was next held.

Mrs Norsh Duggan, mother of deceased, said she last saw her son alive about seven o'clook the previous evening. Some time after the ficing a man named Nash brought in deceased. He was then quite dead.

Patrick Nash stated he heard the firing on the night before, and after the firing he found the boy lying dead in front of where the police barrack had stood. He appeared to be dead from the effect of a gunehot wound in the head.

Mrs Daggan in answer to the Coroner, said her

son had been on the street playing.

Dr Byrne gave evidence describing the nature of the fatal wound inflicted.

The just found that death was due to the wound deposed to by the doctor, adding a similar rider to their verdict in the case of Harris.

Patrick Nash, recalled, stated he could not say whether the shot was fired by the military, the striken or the relica

## SUSPECTED CITY INCENDIARISM.

## Attempt to Burn Technical Institute.

What was like a deliberate attempt was made to burn the City Technical Institute early yesterdey morning. A little before five o'clock Right Constable Boland, on duty in O'Centell Avenue, observed amoké issuing from the building, and manediately he seat word to the Fire Brigade from Mr C. Sheehan's house. Promptly the Brigade, under Lieutenant Hogen, arrived, and found that the inquiry office on the ground floor was ableste. The fire had not got a grip of the building at the time, and in the overse of half an hour the Brigade had the fire extinguished. An examination of the premises by Lieutenant Hogen showed that the office window was broken, and the remains of what looked like flannel or finalliette were found inside activated with petrol. Ontside the front entrance—the Lieutenant also picked up a piece of clock agrinkled with petrol. Were it not for the prompt discovery of the Night Constable and the timely arrival of the Brigade nothing could have saved the Institute from disaster. The damage done was confined to the destraction of a couple of typewising machines and some documents. The building cost £10,000 to erect.

## DUBLIN TRAGEDY.

#### Railway Chairman Shot Dead,

Dublin was startled shortly before one o'clock yesterday by the news of a sensational tragedy. The Right Ron Frank Brooke, P.C. D.L. Chairman of the Dublin and South Eastern Railway man of the Dublin and South-Eastern Railway Company, was shot dead in his own private room at Westland Row station some time after noon. Mr Brooke, who was born in the year 1851, was a con of the late Mr George Frederick Brooke, who was the eighth con of Sic Basil Brooke, the first baronet. He resided at Coolattin, Shillelagh, County Wicklow. He was appointed Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Dublin and South-Eastern Railway in the year 1917, succeeding Mr F W Pim in that position. During his occupancy of that office he took the liveliest interest in the affairs of the company and was respirable for the of that office he took the liveliest interest in the affairs of the company; and was responsible for the carrying out of many improvements on the system. He was very popular with the other members of the directorate, and was highly respected by all the officials. He was a personal friend of Lord French. Mr Brooke was one of the best of sportemen, and was a member of the Turi Club and the I.N.H.S.C.
