## MAJOR T D HACKETT, D.S.O.

Major T D Hackett, I.A., whose name appears in the "London Gazette" of the 23rd July as having been awarded the Distinguished Service Order, is the son of the Dean of Limerick, Major Hackett distinguished himself in 1918 by relieving an officer of the Indian Civil Service, who, with an ercort of Military Police, was surrounded in the hills between Burma and Manipur by an armed body of the Kuki tribe. After a journey of ten days, mostly by river, Major Hackett, with a small force of 50 rifles, succeeded in extricating the civil officer and his excert, and in getting sway all the wounded, ammunition, and stores. For his work on this occasion he received the congratulations of the Lieutenant-Governor of Burma. He was then put in command of a column which operated most successfully for four months in these hills and deteated the Kukis in several engagements, finally driving the enemy into the Bomrat tract, unadministered territory to the porth. In 1919 Major Hackett was given command of the troops, comprised of three command of the Groups, comprised of three columns, in the Somra area, under General Sir Henry Keary, K C.B., D.S.O., who sommanded the entire Burma Assam force. The Somra tract force subdued and took over the tract of some 700 square miles, captured or effected the surrender of all the rebel chiefs-22 altogether-and opened up this newly sequired territory, with a hill road of 120 miles in length. The disarmament of the whole area was also satisfactorily achieved.

## DEATH OF MR ROBERT CARTLEDGE

Many old friends will regret to learn of the death of Mr Robert Cartledge, which took place at his residence, 8 Pery Square, on the let instant. In early life he joined the Army, and eventually retired as Quartermaster sergeant in the 73rd Regiment. Subsequently, and for a long period, he was storekeeper at the Limerick Lunatio Asylum, where he was a great favourite with the staff, and kindly and sympathetic towards the inmates. He retired on pension many years ago, and for some time past had been in failing health. Of a genial and ever-courteous disposition, he won the good-will of all who knew him, and his demise has been learned with genuine sorrow for the loss of an old and sterling friend. The funeral took place to-day, the interment being in St Munchin's Cemetery.
