Bodies of Three Soldiers Found

The remains of Private McEroy, H. L. I, one of the four soldiers drowned in a boating accident at Carrigaholt three weeks ago were washed ashore at Aylevaroo on Friday week. His funeral which took places on Saturday was very large, being attended by a great many of the inhabitants of the town. The ex-service men of Kilrush took charge of the remains and bors them through the town, whilst about 49 soldiers from their quarters lined each side of the way to the Shanakyle Cemetery where the burial took place.
