Inquest Falls Through

Brother-in-Law's Statement

Dr M R Clery, Divisional Coroner, attended at the Boardroom of Limerick Workhouse yesterday for the purpose of holding an inquest on the body of Edward Paget, an ex-soldier, who died in the institution on Monday night as a reult, it is alleged, of injuries received on Sunday at the hands of the police

The deceased was a married man, aged 48, and lived at Carroli's lane, near St. Joseph's Church.

The Coroner said in the circumstances the inquiry fell through. He had been informed by a brother-in-law of the deceased that any person that witnessed the assault would not come forward to give evidence, and then a jury could not be empannelled to find the cause of dea h. He (Coroner) had done his duty by journey to hold the inquest,

In the ceurse of a statement given to the Ocroner, the brother-in-law of the deceased said that he saw him last alive at four wolock on Sunday, when he was in his usual health. came home at six o'clock, and stated he was badly beaten near the People's Park by policemen. At six o'clock next morning he became unconscious, and by direction of Dr Graham was sent to hospital.

Ex-Servicemen's Tribute.

The funeral of Mr Edward Paget, late of the 18th Royal Irish Regiment, who, as stated, died from injuries received by being assaulted by the police on Sunday, took place this evening from St. Michael's Parochial Church. The ex-servicemen turned out in large numbers, and something like a thousand of them marched in the cortege to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, where the internment took place. All along the line of route to the cemetery was filled with spectators, who showed the greatest respect for the dead. The coffin was taken on the shoulders of ex-servicemen in relays to the last resting place, where the officiating clergy were Rev Father Dwane, Adm .. Rev Father Thornhill, C.C. and Rev Father Haunan, C.C.

The chief mourners were the widow of the deceased, Mr T Sexton, brother-in-law; Miss Sexton, sister-in-law, and other relatives.
