At 5.30 on Sunday morning the valet found him stretched on the floor. He called in Monsignor Odelim, who gave the Cardinal absolution. The doctors attributed death to a heart attack. Cardinal Amette was 70 years of age.

Paris, Monday.—The "Liberte" states that Mme, Sarah Bernhardt has been taken ill since her return to Paris from a stay of three months on her estate at Bells Isle. Serious anxiety is felt by her friends concerning her condition, and a doctor is in constant attendance on her.

## MR. W. K. VANDERBILLT'S WILL.

A New York message says:—The will of the late Mr W K Vanderbilt has now been published. Bequests of one million dollars each are left to his grandsous, the Marquis of Blandford and Lord Ivor Churchill, the sons of the Dake and Ducheas of Marlborough. The will expresses the testator's desire that his racing stable should be dispersed, and directs the executors to sell his racehorees and racing equipment—wherever found in France—as soon as convenient or possible. The proceeds are to be turned over to his sons, William K, and Harold.

## RAID AT KOCKAINY, BRUFF.
