A telegram from Paris on Sunday states:—Cardinal Amette, Archbishop of Paris, died suddenly this morning. On Saturday afternoon, says a later telegram, the first symptoms of illness were noticed, and his valet visited him several times during the night. At 5.30 on Sunday morning the valet found him stretched on the floor. He called in Monsignor Odellin, who gave the Cardinal absolution. The doctors attributed death to a heart attack. Cardinal Amette was 70 years of age.

SARAH BERNHARDT ILL.

Paris, Monday.—The “Liberte” states that Mme. Sarah Bernhardt has been taken ill since her return to Paris from a stay of three months on her estate at Belle Isle. Serious anxiety is felt by her friends concerning her condition, and a doctor is in constant attendance on her.

MR. W. K. VANDERBILT'S WILL.

A New York message says:—The will of the late Mr W K Vanderbilt has now been published. Bequests of one million dollars each are left to his grandsons, the Marquis of Blandford and Lord Ivor Churchill, the sons of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough. The will expresses the testator's desire that his racing stable should be dispersed, and directs the executors to sell his racehorses and racing equipment—wherever found in France—as soon as convenient or possible. The proceeds are to be turned over to his sons, William K. and Harold.

RAID AT KOCKAINY, BRUFF.

A raid was made on Sunday morning by a number of masked and armed men in some houses at Knockainy, near Bruff, where members of the Ordnance Survey Staff had quarters. Maps and other important documents were seized and taken away. The Ordnance Survey officials were not molested.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

A man named William O'Kelly, aged about 40 and single, was accidentally killed on Saturday night at Ballyana, Kilmallock. O'Kelly was standing at Ballyana Cross, when a man on horseback approached. The horse became restive and plunged backwards and forwards, knocking down O'Kelly, and then falling upon him. Deceased was 15 years in the employment of Mrs Ryan, Dromin House. He lingered but for a short time after the accident.

WRANGEL'S TROOPS DEFEATED.

The Russian Delegation in London last night issued the following telegram, received from Moscow on August 30:—Wrangel's landing forces in Kuban completely annihilated. After defeating them the Red troops cut their communication, then surrounded them, and during a night raid destroyed their headquarters. North of the Taurian government Wrangel is completely beaten. He holds now only the Crimea.
