CURRENT COMMENT.

A Floating Industrial Exposition.

The former Kronprinz Wilhelm, now the Von Steuben, is being converted into a floating industrial exposition, to be provided with 1,500 exhibits of American manufacture. It is to make a cruise around the world. These exhibits will include shoes, silver-ware, locomotives, motor-boats, and electrical appliances, and the places to be visited will be so wide apart as Havans, Cape Town, Sydney, Bombay, and the Mediterranean ports. There will be a crew of 350 men, and the start will be made in January.

Body Recovered.

The body of Miss Maureen Reynolds, Limerick, the young lady who was drowned at Kilkee on Tuesday last, was recovered last evening at a point near the Diamond Rocks, where the tragedy took place. The remains will be removed to St Michael's church, Limerick to-morrow by motor, and the funeral will take place on Thursday at 3 o'clock for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.

FUNERAL OF COL. O'GRADY, D.L., C.B.

The remains of the late Col. J De C O'Grady, C.B., D.L., J.P. were laid to rest in the grounds of Kilballyowen, on the 1st September. He had been laid up since April, 1919. Lately he seemed to be improving in health, but the end came suddenly on the morning of the 30th August, at the age of 64. Col O'Grady had, as already noticed in the "Chronicle," a distinguished military career. He retired from the service in 1902, to take up his abode in his ancestral home, which he dearly loved, and where he took the greatest interest in local matters. He was beloved by all his neighbours for his most genial and friendly disposition. The funeral was largely attended. Amongst those present were—Major O'Grady (cousin), Dr McLaughlin, Dear MacNamara, Mr Henry Bouchier, Mr Claud Bouchier, Mr F Gubbins, Major Fitzgerald, General and Mrs Franks, Mr Hinchy, Mr Mahony, Mr Fogarty, etc. The service was taken by the Dean of Cashel, assisted by the Rector of Knockaney, the ground being consecrated by the Rector of the parish.
