

**BUYING LESS SUGAR.**

The sugar problem appears to be rapidly solving itself. A grocer in the suburbs, whose business is entirely middle-class, declares that nine out of every ten of his customers are buying less than the ration allowed in consequence of the high price, says "A Londoner's Diary" in the "Evening Standard". A good deal of the sugar allotted for jam making also has not been taken up. The chief sugar shortage this summer has been at the seaside, and the discontinuance of the holiday food forms may have had something to do with it.
