Kerryman Charged.

A district Courtmartial assembled at the Lime. rick County Prison this morning for the trial of Patrick Landers, Listowel, civilian.

The acoused was charged with bailig id possession of documents likely to cause disaffection amongst his Majesty's subjects. The first charge was being in possession of a document not allowing solipitors to practice unless they took an cath of allegiance to Dail Eireann; the second was being in possessior of a document relating to a policeman visiting a certain house to see a young lady, and the third with being in possession of a document signed "Captain Connor," stating that a coastguard station was to be attacked, and giving directions to have forces taken out to blook the roads to Ballybanion. That document was addressed to Commandant Landers.

When saked to plead, the accused said he did not recognise the court, but he had no objection to

be tried by any member of the court.

The President entered a plea of not guilty.

A milifary officer stated he was in a p A military officer stated he was in a raiding party at Nolan's publichouse. Listowel, on the 12th August. In a bedroom occupied by the accused he saw a member of the raiding party take a bundle from a mattress. After the search the accused, who was standing outside the publichouse, was also searched, and two documents taken from him. On the pight of the 2nd September he was in the party that arrested Landers at Ballinruday House.

The accused—Do you know that anonymous letters have been sent to Ballinruddy Comp against

me?-Not to my knowledge.

As a matter of fact the roads were not blocked to Ballinguddy ?-No.

During your time in Listowel have you seen me interfere with either policemen or soldiers?-No. The Prosecutor-Do you know whether or not the accused holds any position in his Majesty's

The President-Do you know anything favour-

able to Mr Landers' reputation ?- During the whole time he was out for peace in Listowel. When some of the soldiers got drunk he ordered the Volunteers to take them back to camp.

The President-Irish Volunteers !- Yes.

another military witness stated he ascompanied last witness on a raid at Nolan's publichouse on the night of the 12th August. On searching the room occupied by accused he found the documents (produced) and handed them to last witness. On the morning of the 3rd inst. when arrested at Ballinruddy House, the typewritten document (produced) about solicitors was found on him. Accused-Row long are you in Listowel !-

During that time have I ever interfered with either soldiers or policemen?—Not to my knew-

A civilian witness said he knew accused for len and a half years, and during that time he did not held any position in his Majesty's forces to entitle him to call himself Commandant or Captain. accused was not out against the police or soldiers, and witness saw him cautioning people who were against the soldiers, and police, and on one occasion he saw him escorting soldiers to Ballinuddy Camp when they were in danger of being attacked. On another occasion he saved withese's life by coming to his rescue when he was about to be attacked by forty Volunteers.

This closed the evidence.

The President asked accused if he wished to The President asked accused in a call any witnesses for his defence, or to make any call any witnesses for his defence, or to make any statement, and he replied in the neg tive. desired, however, to say, with regard to the second charge of the policeman visiting the young lady's house, that the young lady in question was married to the policeman.

POLICE AMBUSHED IN CO. LIMERICK.

Constable Shot Dead.

It was officially reported on Sunday that at Abbeyfasle on Saturday night, a police patrol was simbushed, and one constable, John O'Malo y, was shot dead. Another constable was slightly wounded in the head, and a third in the check.

A Press message says-A Constabulacy petrol was ambushed about 11 o'clock on Saturday hight near Abbeyfeals, and fired on by an armed party of men. Constable Mahony was shot dead and two other members of the patrol, the head conatable and a constable, were wounded. A sarge force of military and Chustabulary proceeds on Sunday from Limerick for the scene of the ambush.

Police Constable John Q'Mahony, shot dead near Abbeyfeale (Co Limerick) on Saturday night, was a son of Mr D O'Mahony, boat builder, Castletownshend, Skibbereen, and had about four years' service. The remains of Constable O'M shony are being brought to Castletownshend for interment.

Two Civilians Dead.

Another tragedy occurred in Abbeyfeal last night, when two civilians lost their lives.

It is reported that the civilians, who were passing the police parrack between 9 and 10 o'clock, were challenged by police. They made ro reply, and were then ordered to halt. Ignoring the order, they ren away. They were fired upon by the police, and both, it is stated, were shot dead.

A Temperance Hall was burned and other establishments damaged, following the death of Constable John Mahony, who was fatally wounded when a police patrol was attacked outside Abbayfeale late on Paturday night.

Constable Mahony received the last rites of the Church from Father Fitzgerald and Father Carr. Both clergymen accompanied the remains to the police barrack.

Head Constable Little and Constable Collins, who were wounded on the same occasion, are progressing favourably.

It was only on Sunday morning that the towns-

people learned of the tragic cocurrence.

Father Carr, at first Mass, requested the prayers of the congregation for Constable Mahony. They had, he said, been congratulating themselves on the peageful state of their parish when the terrible occurrence of the previous night involved the life of an inoffensive man. He did not think anyone in the district was capable of such a deed, and they extended their sympathy to the deceased's relatives.

Large numbers of soldiers and police arrived in the town.

The local temperance hall was subsequently burned. Mr Woulfe's pharmacy was considerably tamaged, and windows were broken in Mrs Leen's and Mr D O'Neill's houses. Kilbonlea l'emperance Hall was set on fire, and the office at Devon road creamery was damaged.

Military and police have been patrolling the

Later particulars state that on Sunday night Devon Road Co-operative Creamery was partially burned down. No reason is assigned for the outrage, the damage involved amounting to a few thousand pounds.

The names of the two men shot dead in the neighbourhood of Abbeyleale on Monday are Bartholomew Healy, labourer, and Patrick Hartnett, jural postman, both young men, and living in the locality.
