There were no signs of a struggle. The deceased men had no fireerms.

Wituess-The shooting struck me as being rather drastic under the circumstances. The man referred to was perfectly cool and collected. He voluntarily showed witness his pistol, calling attention to the fact that he had expended only three rounds. He said he climbed through the hedge before he shot them. Witness knew nothing of the man's previous history

The inquiry was adjourned.
