ABBEYFEALE SHOOTING CASE.

The military inquiry into the circumstances
under which Patrick Hartnett, postman, and
Jeremiah Healy, blacksmith, were found shot
dead in a field 300 yards from the police barracks,
Abbeyfeale, was held on Thursday.

A large force of military was on duty outside
the barracks, while on the opposite side of the
road a number of people were assembled at the
wake of young Hartnett.

Mr J Wolfe, solicitor, Abbeyfeale, represented
the relatives of the deceased.

A number of witnesses having been examined,
A cadet of the R.I.C deposed that about 6.15
(old time) the man referred to as the "Black and
Tan" came to him in the barrack yard and asked
to speak to him. He walked to the barrack gate
with witness and said:—"I have just shot two
men. I was standing at the barrack gate and said
'Good evening' to two young men who were pass-
ing. They took no notice and I followed them, as
they looked suspicious. They kept looking back
and then broke into a run. I ran after them, and
they went through a gap in the hedge on the right
of the road. I shouted to them 'halt, halt' as
they wouldn't stop running I shot them." When
witness asked were they dead, he replied, "I
know when a man is dead." He told two con-
stables to tell the head constable, and then went
with this man, who showed the witness the two
civilians lying on their backs inside the field, about
three yards from the road and about a yard apart.
The younger of the two had a soft hat clenched in
his left hand as if taken off to enable him to run
better. There were no signs of a struggle. The
deceased men had no firearms.

Mr Wolfe—Did anything strike you as extra-
ordinary about the whole story?

Witness—The shooting struck me as being
rather drastic under the circumstances. The man
referred to was perfectly cool and collected. He
voluntarily showed witness his pistol, calling
attention to the fact that he had expended only
three rounds. He said he climbed through the
hedge before he shot them. Witness knew nothing
of the man's previous history.

The inquiry was adjourned.

FORBIDDEN INQUESTS.

The following official communication was issued
yesterday:—

"Attempts to hold Coroners' inquests in cases
or district where they are forbidden under the
instructions of the Lord Lieutenant will, it is
understood, be promptly suppressed and the parti-
cipants arrested.

"It is reported in the Press that the Louth
County Council, under instructions from Dail
Eireann, have instructed their Secretary to com-
municate with the Coroner and the Volunteer, so
that inquests may continue to be held, although
the holding of inquests is prohibited in that
county.

"It is now understood that if any such attempt
is made, the Coroner and jurors, as well as any
barrister, solicitor, or doctor appearing at such
inquest, will be promptly arrested.
