

SHOOTING IN CORK.

General Strickland's Escape.

An official report issued from Dublin Castle states that an attempt was made last night to assassinate General A P Strickland, K.C.B., Commanding the Cork Division.

At 6 p.m., when the General was motoring from Cork military barracks to the city, he was fired at on St Patrick's Hill by a number of men, who were armed with revolvers.

The driver was slightly wounded, and the car was penetrated by bullets. General Strickland returned the fire, and one man, who was either killed or wounded, was carried away by his companions.

A Cork correspondent telegraphed last night—As a motor car, the property of General Strickland, was going from the military barracks in the direction of the city, and at the corner of King street and Bridge street revolver shots were fired by a number of men. It is stated that there were four military officers in the car at the time. These returned the fire. So far as is known none of the officers was injured. Three windows in King street were riddled with bullets. One young man was injured in the course of the attack. He was taken to the North Infirmary, where his injury—a bullet wound in the forearm—was dressed, and he left the institution without giving his name or address. There were many wild rumours in connection with the affair, but no confirmation could be obtained. The military declined to give any information.

LATE MR J A LYNCH.

No Public Inquest.

It was feared on Thursday night that a military inquiry was opened in the evening regarding the death of Mr J. A. Lynch, of Bulgallen, Kilmallock, a member of Limerick County Council, who was shot dead in a bedroom in the Royal Exchange Hotel, Dublin, on Wednesday, but owing to a technical error in the notice of the inquiry, which read "the County of Dublin" instead of "the City of Dublin," it was decided to adjourn the inquiry and start the proceedings yesterday. The inquiry was to be on the usual lines and private. Neither the time the inquest would open nor the place where it was to be held was made known.

The Coroner stated that he did not intend to hold an inquest. The remains lay in the Morgue, and Mr Power, solicitor, Kilmallock, went to Dublin, on Thursday to watch the interests of the family of the deceased man.

In connection with the shooting of Mr John A. Lynch, Limerick County Councillor, at the Royal Exchange Hotel, Dublin, on Wednesday morning last, a Military Court assembled at Dublin Castle yesterday to inquire into the circumstances. The Press representatives were told that portion of the proceedings would be held in secret, and if they called in the evening they would be informed when they could be admitted. When, however, they returned later they were refused admittance to the Castle, an order being read to them to the effect that the public would not be admitted to any portion of the inquiry. The President of the inquiry, Captain Grover, published an announcement to-day asking the legal representatives of the deceased man, Lynch, whose body still lies at the Morgue, to apply immediately at Headquarters, Dublin District, Dublin Castle, where an order is waiting for the interment of the remains.

The Dublin City Coroner, Dr. J. A. Byrre, yesterday, with the Lord Mayor of Dublin, saw, and having heard Mr P. Lynch, K.C., Dr Byrre stated his position in regard to a Military Court at Dublin Castle to inquire into the circumstances of the shooting, and said that on Thursday he received a communication from the Chief Commissioner of the Dublin Metropolitan Police, which he read, and which intimated that a Military Court of Inquiry was to be held in lieu of a Coroner's inquest in the case of John Lynch, and in view of that he had not acted on the Coroner's precept. Attention was drawn by him to the wording of the Order, which used the words "County of Dublin." He was Coroner for the City of Dublin, and a further Order was sent to him.

Mr Lynch, K.C.—Whose name is on top? The Coroner—By the Lords Justices and Governors of Ireland. The last notice he received, in his opinion, answered Mr Lynch's objection. He had to over-rule the objection, and in the face of that Order he could not hold the inquiry. Those present subsequently left.

Interment in Kilmallock.

The remains of the late Mr J. A. Lynch will leave Dublin this evening for Kilmallock where they will rest overnight in the Catholic Church. The interment will take place to-morrow at Kilmallock.

At a meeting to-day of the members of the Finance Committee of the Limerick County Council, a resolution was unanimously adopted tendering to the relatives of the late Mr John A. Lynch sincere sympathy over the death of their esteemed colleague, and placing on record the abhorrence, by the members of the Committee, of the circumstances attending that regrettable and
