## CHIEF SECRETARY AND POLICE.

The "Pall Mall Gazette" on Tuesday evening published the following telegram from Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland:—

"Dublin, Monday.

"There is no truth in the allegations that the Government connive at or support reprisals.

"The Government condemn reprisals, have issued orders condemning them, and have taken steps to prevent them.

"Nearly one hundred policemen have been brutally murdered, five recently in Clare on one day, by expanding bullets, resulting in horrible mutilation.

"In spite of intolerable provocation the police forces maintain their discipline, are increasing in number and efficiency, and command the support of every law-abiding citizen.

"The number of alleged reprisals is few and the damage done exaggerated.

## THE LATE MR A. BRUCE.

The Rev A E Neill officiated at the grave.

## ENGLISH POLICE B

A London correspondent writes that the Home Secretary is to consider applications by the police for the grant of a bonus in consideration of the cost of living has risen.
