DEATH OF MR EUGENE A. WICKHAM.

It is with much regret, that will be shared in by old colleagues, friends, and acquaintances, we have to announce the death, last evening, of Mr Eugene A Wickham, at his residence, Lifford Cottage, Banninacorra. Mr Wickham was well known to many friends, his life-time having been spent in Limerick. He was a member of the Limerick Boat Club, one of their representatives in the old days at several regattas, and, like many of his friends, took more than a passing interest not only in rowing, but angling, football, and sport generally. He joined the Limerick Postal Telegraph Service early in life, and some years ago retired with the rank of Telegraph Superintendent. Wide sympathy will be extended to the relatives of the deceased, who was the eldest son of the late Edmund L Wickham, and grandson of the late John Wickham, J P, 17th Regiment, of Madeboy, County Limerick. The funeral takes place from Lifford Cottage on Saturday morning for the cemetery attached to St Mary's Cathedral.
