A later account states that some of the bridges between the city and Bunnatry were damaged, including, it is said, the bridge at Bunnatry. In some places it appears the roadway was dug up to a depth of about three or four feet.

SHOTS FIRED AT MILITARY PARTY.

Shots were fired at a military party in Talbot street, Dublin, on Thursday, and the soldiers returned the fire. An officer and two civilians were killed, and three men were arrested.

The soldiers left their lorries and returned the fire with their rifles, and the people fled in all directions. It then became known that a military officer and two civilians had been killed, and some others, including a soldier and a policeman, had been wounded. Three arrests were made.

It would appear from inquiries made yesterday that the death roll in the Talbot-st affair certainly numbered three, if not four, while two others were wounded.

The military authorities in Dublin have published a notice warning all law-abiding people to avoid areas in the city where troops and policemen are operating.

NIGHT MAIL CAR HELD UP.

The night mail car from Tipperary to Limerick Junction was held up some distance outside the town by masked men with revolvers on Wednesday, and mail bags were taken. They were found on Thursday morning on the roadside near Roesborough.

DEATH OF MRS H L STEWART.

Numerous friends in Limerick and elsewhere will regret to learn of the death of Mrs Stewart, relict of the late Mr H L Stewart, jeweller, 104, George Street, which took place at her residence this morning after a long illness. She was a lady of a very kind and retiring nature, and held in affectionate regard by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance and who will sincerely sympathise with her family in their keen bereavement. The funeral will take place for the family burial place at St Munchin's at 9.30 on Tuesday morning.
