

## LINK WITH LIMERICK'S PAST

Admiral Sir Michael Calme Seymour, Bt, whose death is announced, (says a writer in the "Independent") was descended from an Irish family, the founder of which was Alderman John Seymour Sheriff 1708, and Mayor 1720, of Limerick. His grandson, William Seymour, was also Sheriff and Mayor of Limerick and the grandfather of Michael Seymour, who entered the Navy and rose to be Admiral, K C B, and baronet during the Napoleonic war. His grandson, who died on Monday week, was also in the Navy as is the new baronet, Vice Admiral Sir Michael Calme Seymour, who served at the battle of Jutland, and was recently second in command in the Mediterranean. He is married to a daughter of the late Baron Nugent.

## THE LATE COL. H. S. MASSY, C.B.

The late Col H. S. Massy, C.B., of Grantstown Hall, Tipperary, whose death at Sundgate, Kent, occurred on the 10th instant, took, like his brother, General Dunham Massy, C.B., a great personal interest in his country, and was held in affection by all his neighbours. He married Geraldine Kileen, daughter of George Massy, of Glenville, Co Limerick, and leaves a daughter and a son, Eyre Fitzgerald, who succeeds to the property.

## TRADE IMPORTS

The Uruguayan steamer, Rio Negro, arrived in the Shannon a few days ago, and she is now berthed in the docks discharging a cargo of maize for Messrs Bannatyne. The Rio Negro was a German vessel, and became the property of the Government of Uruguay as one of the results of the defeat of Germany in the recent war. She is a fine vessel, of several thousand tons register, and is manned by a crew in the naval service of Uruguay.

Devon Road. On Sunday night at 9 o'clock or so the manager of the creamery and some friends were standing outside his house not far from the creamery when they observed hay burning in the distance. A little later the headlights of motorcars were seen coming along the road and drew up near the cross.

Evidence in support of counsel's statement was given by Michael O'Mahony, manager of the creamery. He added that when the lorries drew up men dismounted, commended patrol in an outhouse, and set fire to the office, testing room, and general storeroom, the contents of which were consumed.

Expert testimony having been given as to the damage to the equipment and cost of restoration, his Honor gave a decree for £2,000.

Frederick Parker, 61 Nelson street, was allowed £5 10s for the malicious breaking of a plate glass window in his premises on the 15th August.

A sum of £41 8s 3d was awarded Mrs Aubie Shannon, licensed publican, for the malicious destruction of a shop window on the 29th August.

The evidence showed that during the early hours of the morning the window was blown in by an explosion. Pellets resembling those contained in a grenade were found subsequently in the shop.

Mary Davis, Carey's road, claimed £85 compensation, and was awarded £70, for the destruction of windows, doors, and household effects on the 15th August.

An award of £527 4s 8d was made to Dr E O

Michael Ward, furniture dealer, applied for £1,400, the value of goods completely destroyed on the 15th August as a result of the burning of the house at Corumarket Row, of which he was tenant.

The applicant in his evidence stated he belonged to no political party. As a result of the outbreak that took place in the city on the Sunday in question the house in which he carried on his business was destroyed by fire and his stock suffered in the conflagration. He estimated the damage at £1,618.

A decree for £1,350 was given.

Mr Doyle was for the applicant.

Mrs Nellie Pearse, 17 The Crescent, claimed £1,000 for malicious damage to twenty-six houses, her property, in Carey's Road, on the 15th August.

The facts, as testified, were that a systematic attack was made on the houses. Doors and windows were broken, and to make good the damage she would have to lay out £20 in each house.

His Honor awarded compensation to the amount of £500.

Patrick McMahon, High street, was awarded £7 compensation for the malicious breaking of a door and windows on the 15th August.

A claim for £250 compensation was made by Marie Doyle, Edward street, in respect of the malicious damage to plate glass, mirrors, pictures, and other effects on the 15th August.

His Honor awarded £170 compensation.

Compensation to the amount of £18 10s. was awarded Thomas Collins, 49, Parnell street, in respect of a claim of £75 for the malicious breaking of plate glass windows and shutters, also on the 15th August.

Caroline Cochrane, was awarded £7 compensation for the destruction of two windows and window sashes, at No 3 High street, on the same occasion.

Thomas Hayes, grocer and licensed victualler, Parnell-street, applied for £70 compensation for the malicious breaking of a plate-glass window, shutters, and damage to stock-in-trade in his premises, on the same occasion.

Mr J A Doyle, solicitor, represented the applicant, and evidence having been given, his Honor allowed £65 compensation.

## THIS DAY.

His Honor County Court Judge Pigot resumed the hearing of claims for malicious injury listed from the city at 11 o'clock this morning.

Maurice S Power claimed £1,025 compensation for malicious damage to the Railway Hotel on the 21st June, and for loss of trade.

Mr E Leahy, solicitor, appeared for the applicant, whose case was that a policeman was shot dead in the bar of the hotel some three weeks previous. Nothing happened until the 21st June, and in the early morning of that date an explosion occurred which shattered all the windows in the bar, coffee room, and damaged stock, as well as injuring the woodwork. As a result of the explosion his business suffered considerably.

The application was adjourned for production of the books of the hotel with a view to ascertaining the loss suffered in trade.

Edward Mulcahy applied for £40 compensation for the smashing of the windows and frames of twelve houses his property in Carey's Road on the 15th August.

Mr R F Holmes (instructed by Mr E D Hunt, solr), represented applicant, who produced an estimate for the work at £41.

His Honor awarded £40 compensation.

An application was made by Patrick Mullina for £12 compensation for the breaking of windows and frames on the 15th August.

Mr Holmes (instructed by Mr Hunt) was for the applicant.
