

Justice in Ireland in the case of the King v. Cuppage. In this case the magistrates at the Castletownroche Petty Sessions decided that payment made to a workman by way of harvest bonus could be reckoned as wages for the purposes of the Board's Order.

An appeal was taken on a case stated in the matter. The King's Bench ruled that the defendant was not entitled to claim any credit in respect of the harvest payment, that consequently the decision of the justices was wrong in point of law, and that the case should be remitted to them to enter continuances, and to proceed to convict the defendant, who should pay the costs of the case stated.

The Board ordered that steps be taken to bring this judgment before the District Wages Committees, and the several organisations of employers and workmen throughout the country.

A committee of the German Railwaymen's Union have decided that the recent wage concessions are insufficient for both clerks and workmen and have empowered a sub-committee to try and obtain further advantages, or, failing these, put itself in touch with other factors and declare a strike at an opportune moment.
