FUNERAL OF MR DAVID A. TIDMARSH.

The remains of the late Mr David Aloysius Tidmarsh, whose death occurred on Sunday morning at his residence, Lobs, North Circular-road, were interred yesterday in the family burial-place at Mount St Laurence Cemetery. On Tuesday evening the remains were removed to St Munchin's Catholic Church, where they rested overnight on a catafalque in front of the High Altar. Yesterday morning at 10 o'clock Requiem Mass was sung for the dead. The service was attended by a large congregation, which fittingly manifested the respect and esteem in which the deceased gentleman was held in the city. His Lordship the Most Rev Dr Hallinan presided at the Mass, the celebrant of which was the Rev Fr Halpin, C.C.; deacon, Rev Fr Moloney, C.C.; sub-deacon, Rev Fr Hannor, C.C.; and master of ceremonies, Rev Fr McNamara, C.C.

At the close of the service the remains were taken to the hearse, and the funeral travelled by Thomond Bridge, Nicholas-street, Patrick-street, and William-street, to the Cemetery. Along the line traversed the greatest respect was shown for the dead. All the business houses en route had drawn blinds, and the establishment of Messrs Cannock and Co, Ltd, of which the late Mr Tidmarsh was for many years chairman, was closed to give the staff an opportunity of attending the funeral. The cortege was of very large dimensions. It was representative of the trade and business community of the city, as well as public bodies and the working-classes. It was a striking tribute to the great regard in which the late lamented gentleman was held by his fellow-citizens of every class and creed, and especially of the mercantile interests, in which the late Mr Tidmarsh took a deep concern.

Proceeding the hearse walked a large number of the members of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, wearing their chains and ribbons and medals. For a long number of years Mr Tidmarsh was a member of the Confraternity, and the attendance of a representative body of the members at the funeral, and with the Spiritual Director, Rev Fr Robinson, at their head, demonstrated their sympathy on the loss of a loyal and steadfast member. This expression of sympathy, it might be said without misgiving, was shared by the general body of the citizens.

The chief mourners were—Mrs Tidmarsh (widow), Captain D M Tidmarsh, M.C (son), Mrs Thunder, and Miss L Tidmarsh (daughters).

Captain G D Tidmarsh, M.C (son), being on service abroad, was unable to be present at the funeral. Dr Jas Tidmarsh (brother), Colonel R Tidmarsh (cousin), Lt-Colonel Thunder C.M.G., D.S.O., M.C, (son-in-law), and Mr J. Thunder, also regretted being unable to attend.
