Nearly One Thousand Hands Thrown Out.

Between 600 and 700 hands have been thrown
idle as a result of the closing of the six mills of
the Cork Spinning and Weaving Company, Black-
pool, Cork. This action has been rendered neces-
sary by the fact that spinners have sold very
little of their stocks within the past few months,
and indeed the whole trade is practically at a
standstill. No prospect of an early resumption of
work is apparent.

DEATH OF MR W. COLLIER.

We regret to state that Mr William Collier,
who, as already reported, was attacked on Satur-
day night by three men near his house at Crescent
Avenue, and violently assaulted, succumbed to his
injuries yesterday. Mr Collier had been returning
home from business when the attack was made on
him, and he was deprived of his keys and rendered
practically unconscious. His very sad and tragic
end is deeply regretted by friends in city and
country, where he was widely known in connection
with the butter trade. He came from Manchester
35 years ago, and for a lengthened period was local
manager for Messrs. Joseph Stock and Son, of that
city. For some years past he carried on a pro-
vision business in Broad-street. Mr Collier was a
very quiet and inoffensive citizen, and held in
high regard and esteem. He was an old member
of the congregation of the Methodist Church. There
is general sympathy with his family in their
bereavement. The remains will be removed from
his residence to the Methodist Church at 7 o'clock
this evening. There will be a service in the
church at 9.30 to-morrow morning, and the funeral
leaves at 10 o'clock for St. Munchin's.

A Military Inquiry will be held at 10.30
to-morrow into the cause of death.

DEATH OF SERGEANT CORRY.

The death took place this morning, in the
Military Hospital, New Barracks, Limerick, of
Sergeant M. Corry, a member of the city police
force. The deceased contracted a cold last week,
and his condition becoming worse, he was removed
to hospital. Pneumonia supervened, and Sergeant
Corry passed away this morning. The deceased
was about fifty years of age, and had considerable
service in the constabulary, sixteen years of which
he spent in John-street police station. He was a
zealous and efficient officer, and discharged his
duties with tact and courtesy while in the city.
