CHRONICLE THE BALLYBROOD SHOOTING

The man detained in connection with the fatal shooting of Mr Richard Leonard, school attendance officer, at Ballybrood last Briday morning, is described as a machine gun officer, aged 30, en Roglishman, with ten years service. Three arrests had been made, of which two were released.

A remarkable sequel (writes a Hospital correct ponden l to ike death of Richard Leonard took place on Monday. A party of soldiers, with a loggy and an ambulance wan, accompanied by four men in divilian clothes, took possession of Hospital gravayard, where the young man was buried on Sunday. Having provided themselves with spades, they exhumed the remains, which they carried away with them, Shortly afterwards, some of Mr Leonard's relatives arrived at the graveyard, with 1the intention of enclosing the grave with netting. Their surprise can be better imagined than described when they found that the remains had been carried cff.

BOMB THROWN IN CORK.

Six Policemen and Several Civilians Injured.

A Press Association message says :- A bomb was thrown at police crossing the Parnell Bridge, Cork, about 7 30 o'clock on Tuesday evening, and six constables were wounded.

The incident occurred near the chief police headquarters in the city, and the men there turned out with rifles and machine gune. These are stated to have been used on the quays and neighbouring streets, with the result that several persons were wounded.

Several iunosent people, a Cork Correspondent says, were wounded. I'wo of them were sallors belonging to a massel at the docks, name John Owen and John Hughes. A man named George Bouchier was also wounded, as well as two women, one of whom, Mrs Burke, sustained a bullet wound in the thigh.

The official report of the ambush in Cork states that a party of ten policemen was ambushed at Parnell Bridge, Cork, within the martial law area, about 7.30 o'clook on Tuesday night, Seven policemen were wounded, one seriously, and at least five civilians, who hannened to he nassing at

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
