## Five Years' Imprisonment.

Alderman J J Walsh, M.P, for Cork City, who  
was arrested about a week ago in a Cork hotel,  
has been officially informed that a sentence of five  
years' penal servitude has been passed on him.

Alderman Walsh, it will be remembered, was  
one of the prisoners who escaped from Mountjoy  
on the 28th March, 1919, and was, up to his  
arrest some days ago, "on the run." The day  
before he escaped from Mountjoy he was court-  
martialled for an alleged seditious speech, and it  
is for this he has been sentenced to five years.
