DUBLIN COURTMARTIAL. A Missing Witness.

There was an unexpected development yesterday morning at the resumption in the City Hall, Dublin, at 10.30 o'clock, of the general court-martial of three men charged in connection with the shooting dead of a British officer in Lower Mount street on Sunday, November 21st, 1920. The evidence of "Mr O," who occupied the room with Mr M'Mahon, on the morning of the occurrence, was intended to be proceeded with yesterday morning, but when the court had assembled, prosecuting counsel, addressing the court, said that in the case of Teeling, he wished to apply for an adjournment until Friday morning. The most material witness, "Mr O," was stationed at Portsmouth, and had left London last night. His whereabouts were not known, and so far he had not reached Dublin. In the interests of justice, therefore, he would ask that the case should be adjourned. The court assented to the application.

DEATH OF MR DANIEL KENNEALLY.
