LAW RESIGNS Premier of the House

in Ill-health

On Thursday, the Premier, Mr. Bonar Law, announced that he had found it impossible to do his work, and that he was quite worn out, and my wife warned me that my health was such that unless I have long rest an early end is inevitable."

LIMERICK TRAGEDY.

Body Found on River Bank Near Plassy.

The dead body of a young man, bearing five or six bullet wounds, was discovered on the river bank near Plassy Mills. Some of the residents of the locality, which is some three miles from the city, stated that towards midnight on Thursday they heard the report of shots. Enquiries established that a man had been shot and killed, whose name was John O'Grady, was an ex-soldier living in the city with his wife and three children. It is further stated that he was out of work for some time, and that he had been looking for employment. O'Grady's people reside in the Boherbuoy district, and his family lived for a time in Bank Place. It does not appear quite clear as to what took him such a distance from the city at that hour. There was a bullet wound in the head, one on each side of the neck, the others being under the abdomen. He had been dead for some hours when the discovery was made, and the police at once instituted inquiries. In one of the hands a bead was found tied, and papers in the pockets proved his identity. The remains were removed to the mortuary at the New Barracks pending the holding of a military inquiry.

There are various theories regarding the fatality, the facts of which are somewhat difficult to get together.

Two arrests have been made in connection with the tragedy.
