THE FEDAMORE SHOOTINGS.

Three Houses Reported Burned.

In consequence of the fatal shooting of Constable Rogers and the wounding of two other constables near Fedamore on Wednesday night, reprisals were, it is stated, carried out in the district yesterday. As far as can be gathered one house was burned at Fedamore, another at Caher, and a third at Ballybricken.

WINTRY WEATHER.

We were yesterday plunged once more into the depth of winter with frequent showers of snow, sleet, and an icy wind. On the other side of the Channel the conditions are even more wintry.

In Limerick there was a slight fall of snow, followed by some sunshine. To-day the weather was again very cold, and in striking contrast to the warm atmospheric conditions that prevailed earlier in the week.

DUBLIN INCIDENTS.

Mr Patrick O'Neill, who had been a captain in the Army, was shot at and wounded by an unknown man at his lodgings in Dublin yesterday.

Bombs were thrown at military vehicles in Dublin yesterday evening. The driver of one of the cars was wounded.

During Curfew hours last night armed civilians searched Dalkey Post Office for letters from Cork.

NEW VICEROY RETIRES FROM PARLIAMENT.

The "London Gazette" stated last night that the Chancellor of the Exchequer has appointed the Right Hon Lord Edmund Talbot to be Steward and Bailiff of the Three Hundreds of Chiltern.

COAL OWNERS' STATEMENT.

A meeting of the coal-owners was held in London last evening, and at the close the following statement was issued to the Press on behalf of the Coal Mining Association—"The owners at a meeting to-day resolved that the wages of the lower-paid men ought to be adjusted where necessary, and expressed regret that their attempt to secure discussion of the subject had been frustrated by the refusal of the miners to meet them."

THE CORPORATION.

A special meeting of the Limerick Corporation is summoned for Monday evening to consider the rates estimate for the coming twelve months. The Estimates Committee recommend an improvement rate of 10s 8d in the £; a domestic water rate of 1s 6d, a borough rate of 5d, and a general purpose rate of 3s 8d, for the six months ending September. The Council will also be asked to appoint a Retrenchment Committee for the purpose of curtailing expenditure.

FUNERAL OF CONSTABLE ROGERS

This afternoon the funeral of Constable George H Rogers, who was shot in the raid at Fedamore on Wednesday night took place from the New Barracks for the railway station. The band of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers played the funeral march, and the coffin containing the remains of deceased was draped with the Union Jack. There was a large party of police present. Military honours were paid, and the coffin was conveyed by train to Dublin, whence it will be brought by express route to London for interment.
