during the elections to keep order, but since then he did not belong to the Volunteers or take part in politics. His home was searched by the police, and he went to Dublin, returning three weeks ago. He was looking for work, and at Kilfinane he met some men who were Volunteers, and they took him to a house and gave him tea. He was told to be at a place at the foot of the hill at 1 o'clock. A man gave him a revolver, rifle, and ammunition. He did not want to go, but the man said that he should go. They went along, and when he saw the lorries coming he ran through a yard and up a hill. He fired two shots with a rifle, as he was forced to do. He did not fire at the officer or corporal.

Counsel for the accused said that the man was the victim of circumstances over which he had no control.

The Prosecutor said that the evidence against the accused was so damning that it was unnecessary to add anything to what they had heard.

The accused was found guilty, and sentenced to be shot.

The sentence was duly confirmed, and carried out at 3.31 p.m. this evening.
